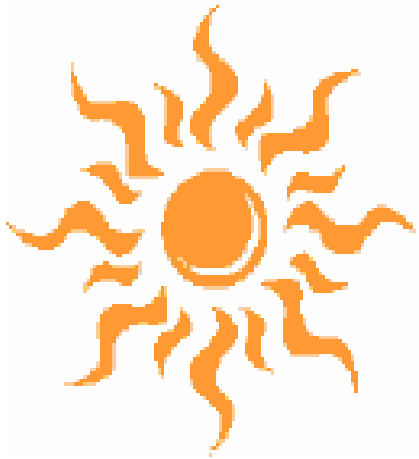

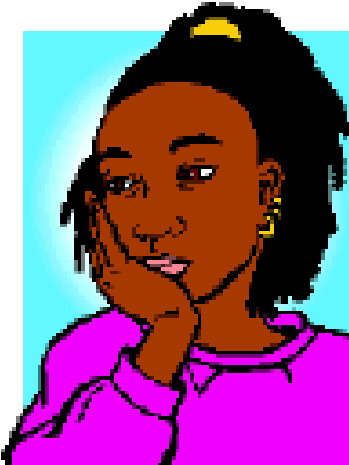

Since many teachers grow plants near the window rather than in the ground outside, I revised the original word to reflect that! Although in the original song the words of each verse are repeated directly in sequence ("a stem growing up from the roots from the seed in the ground"), you can use the words below ("stem growing up from the seed with the roots in the ground") if you want to be more accurate!

If you've got the sun, and if you've got the rain,
You can plant a little seed near the window pane,

Some roots growing out from the seed in the ground.

Repeat song, then:

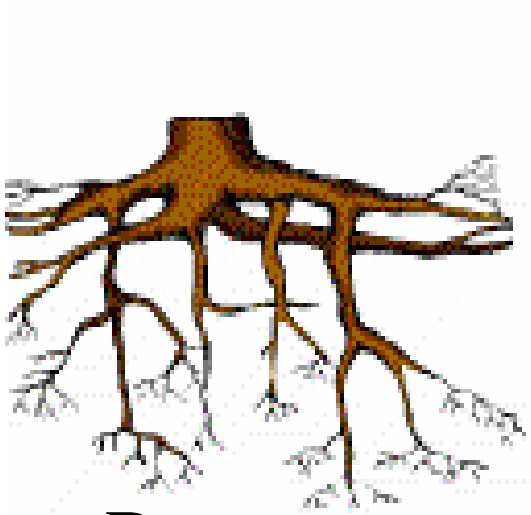
A stem growing up from the seed with the roots in the ground.

Repeat song, then:

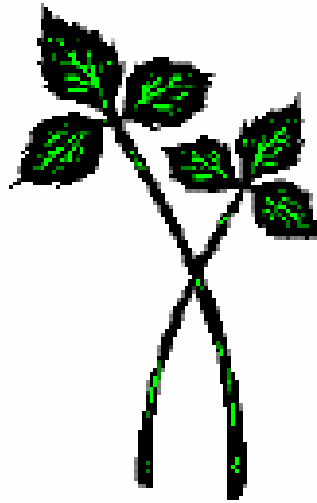
A flower growing out from the stem growing up from the seed with the roots in the ground.

If growing something other than flowers, replace "flower" with appropriate words.

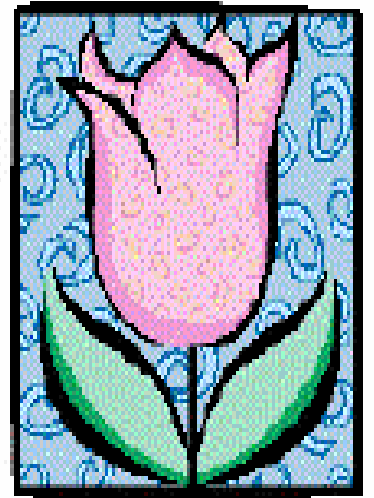
Directions: Cut out these pictures (or draw your own) and use to show the song sequence, or have children use hand/body movements to dramatize.
