Why We Need to Modernize


- Better classrooms and facilities will improve student achievement
- Many school buildings are in poor condition
 - Nearly half are more than 75 years old
- We are losing students to charter schools and other districts
- We have much excess space
 - Good buildings are underused
 - District facilities are well suited to programs currently housed in leased space

Our District is spending millions of dollars each year to maintain excess space and outdated facilities—funds that should be used to improve teaching and learning.

Principles Guiding the Plan

Improved student achievement

- High-quality learning environments
- Maintaining and improving school programs

Efficient allocation of resources, effective management systems

- Efficient use of space
- Lower facility costs
- Flexible financing
 - -Up to 98% of costs paid by New York State

Open communication, family and community involvement

- Transparent process
 - -More than 20 public and school-based events since Nov. 1
- Menu of options for students
- Long advance notice of changes for families
- Well-planned support for staff in building moves
- Ten-year plan will be adjusted as educational requirements and District needs change

Major Changes Since January 10

School No. 4

- Renovation shifted to phase 3, 2016-2017
- Program may size down to K-6 over next two years

School No. 16

- Renovated in phases 2 and 4
- Students return to renovated K-6 school as early as 2015

School No. 22

- Program remains in place through 2017-2018
- Students move to Franklin Campus or replacement building after that

Swing space

Temporary locations are being adjusted to match need

Plan Overview

38 outdated facilities will be modernized

• Students and staff will move to "swing space" while their building is renovated or rebuilt

9 schools are in good condition

- They will get moderate renovation and regular upkeep
- Students and staff will not need to move


47 GREAT SCHOOL BUILDINGS!

5 school facilities in poor condition will eventually be retired

- Students and staff will move to a modern building designed to meet program needs
- Flower City School #54 will move from leased space to school facility #30 this fall
- No currently operating district building will close until 2015
 - Schools No. 22, 25, 36, and 37 will be retired between 2015 and 2020
 - We will work with the city neighborhoods on use and redevelopment options

We will continue to reduce the use of rental space over time

Timing and project specifics will adjust to match available funding, enrollment, and program needs



What Our Plan Will Achieve

- 47 school buildings that are conducive to learning
- No substandard or temporary classrooms
- Efficient, safe and comfortable buildings
- Modern instructional technology
- Facilities that support the full range of student interests and needs, with added family and community services
- Space for music, art and PE at every school
- Sports facilities and fields for junior- and senior-high students
- Efficient and effective allocation of resources
- More attractive and inviting schools for families to choose
