More Quality Learning Time

As Superintendent Bolgen Vargas outlined in RCSD's 2014-2018 Action Plan, the District's focused theory of action — to close the opportunity gap, provide middle-class opportunities, reduce interventions, improve outcomes, and stabilize finances — is based on the belief that all children can succeed if given the right opportunities and the support they need.

The District is committed to providing schools that utilize every available tool to engage students in positive activities.

Rochester students historically have received the least instructional time of any group of students in Monroe County and among the lowest in the nation. To improve achievement, the District is strategically adjusting time in school to make student learning and growth a constant.

One critical step the District has taken is to participate with the National Center on Time & Learning in the TIME (Time for Innovation Matters in Education) Collaborative, an innovative national program that expands learning time beyond the traditional school day and school year, to provide broader, more enriching learning experiences for students.

Through this effort, the District aims to help close the opportunity gap that puts low-income students at a severe disadvantage and to make up for "summer learning loss" resulting from time off during summer break, which disproportionately impacts students from low-socio-economic backgrounds.

Students in expanded learning schools not only benefit from more time for learning, but also from enhanced individualized intervention, additional enrichment opportunities, and greater opportunities for development and family engagement. Expanded learning also ensures that students and teachers have the time and support necessary to teach and to learn.

Five schools in the District were selected for this program beginning in the 2013-14 school year and another five schools joined in September 2014.

Schools were selected following a collaborative planning process involving teachers, administrators, community members, union officials, and parents.

Participating students at each school will receive 300 hours of scheduled school time, which equals eight more weeks of school than the typical school year.

Mary McLeod Bethune School No. 45


— focusing on community-based, wraparound services, including academic supports, counseling, and recreational programming
