TENET 3	1c: Setting Instructional Outcomes	 Identify exactly <u>what students will be expected to learn</u> <u>Outcomes</u> do not describe what students will <i>do</i>, but <u>what they will</u> <u>learn.</u> <u>Outcomes determine the instructional activities</u>, the resources used, their suitability for diverse learners, and the methods of assessment employed, they hold a central place in Domain 1. <u>Outcomes are of a number of different types</u>: factual and procedural knowledge, conceptual understanding, thinking and reasoning skills, and collaborative and communication strategies. At the distinguished level the teacher <u>solicits ideas from students</u> on how best to structure the learning.
