


Grant helps by, "Restocking things and clean out the coffee pot."

While Gorh, "[Works] 5th & 6th periods, prepping everything we need... especially the coffee. And I clean up the coffee station."


Podsiadly adds, "I like that students get to come in and talk to us. We get to know [other students] a little better because we're not around all the students all the time. But we get to see all the students during that time.
