

Mrs. Monk-George (aka G-Money) is a living environment teacher at Wilson that is known by her offbeat teaching style and behavior. She makes her class fun and enthusiastic for students but has a different persona outside of school.

Because she acts "cool," there are rumors floating around that Monk-George uses drugs, which, she says, "is totally false." While Monk-George is extremely enthusiastic, she is far from a partier.

Monk-George describes herself as a very religious person. In fact, she is an active follower of Baha'i.

Baha'i teaches humans how to know and love god through prayers, reflection and your service to community. Some of the Baha'i practices are daily prayers, meditation, contemplation and fellowship with followers of all religions.

Baha'i faith was found in the 19-century by Bahá'u'lláh (ba-haa-ol-laa) in Persia and literally means "the Glory of God."

While reading a bunch of articles about the Baha'i belief, Monk-George felt an instant connection. She felt like it was something for her and it was a good feeling that went straight to her heart.

In this belief, no one is "above" anyone else in the community

She said that the Baha'i belief makes her see the world in many different ways and shows her the reason why that she is a part of this world.

Along with teaching at Wilson, she teaches children in a Baha'i class where kids have fun while completing community service projects. The class also reads stories about Baha'i, memorizes prayers and discusses what the different quotes and writings mean.

Monk-George describes a frequent discussion about, "the source of courage and power is the promotion of the Word of God and steadfastness in His Love."

Every month she hosts an event for her Baha'i community giving the people an opportunity to learn something new. Last month, she brought a professor from RIT to talk about the learning of science.

While she may be described as offbeat or different, Monk-George uses natural methods to enjoy life by helping others while finding her own way.



Cesar Chavez Day

Cesar Chavez Day takes place on his birthday, March 31. On this day people celebrate and honor the birth and legacy of this Mexican American labor movement leader.

Chavez fought for the rights of migrant farm workers, the farm laborers that work have to move from farm to farm as the seasons change, in the Southwestern United States. The work is difficult and dangerous and Chavez knew it all too well since he and his parents worked in the fields.

Chavez turned into an activist, promoting the rights of farm workers. He was acting to increase wages and improve the farmers working conditions.

In 1962, he founded The National Farm Workers Association, that later merged with the Agricultural Workers Organizing Committee, and together they created the United Farm Workers.

According to The United Farm Workers website, Chavez organized nationwide boycotts of agricultural products until working conditions were improved and salary demands were met, used nonviolent tactics by leading workers in long marches against low living wages, and led a boycott of table grapes.

The 1968 grape boycott mobilized consumer support and won a contract with the major grape owners of California.

Another tactic he used was to go on hunger strikes until the violence against strike workers ended.

It took five years of constant protests and strikes for the United Farm Workers to win a concession when they secured living wages and unionized the grape fields.

With its success, the United Farm Workers grew larger and represented over 50,000 farm workers.

The United Farm Workers continued to bring together farm workers and employers to collectively bargain for workers' rights.

Chavez led the United Farm workers Organization and fought for the rights of farm workers until his death in 1993.

On March 31, 2008 Obama issued a statement stating, "Chavez left a legacy as an educator, environmentalist, and a civil rights leader. And his cause lives on. As farm workers and laborers across America continue to struggle for fair treatment and fair wages, we find strength in what Cesar Chavez accomplished so many years ago. And we should honor him for what he's taught us about making America a stronger, more just, and more prosperous nation."

And in 2014, President Obama made Cesar Chavez Day a federal commemorative holiday in honor of Chavez's achievements.

Trooping is voluntary so the characters do not get any kind of compensation. If a person insists on paying, the 501st asks that they donate to the charity they are trooping for that night.
