- Francis Parker offers students an additional 180 hours of school time per year (an additional 60 minutes of daily instructional time) - the equivalent of five more weeks of school than the typical school year
- The expanded school day is from 7:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m.

Why Choose School 23: Essential Elements Highlights

Engaging Enrichment

• Student schedules include exciting enrichment electives beyond traditional Rochester City School District classes. Sample enrichment classes include the following:

Ballet – students learn the basics of ballet **Super Hero Training** – students build selfconfidence through performing a variety of physical skills and learning important safety and first aid lessons

Minecraft – provides an understanding of a fictional world of farmland, raising animals and mining, in which students must work together to survive; students write arguments to support claims in an analysis of substantive topics or texts, using valid reasoning and relevant and sufficient evidence

School Play – gives students a basic understanding of theater production, process, and performance

STEM electives are available for all students grades K-6

Zombie Geography – provides an understanding of the tools of geography in a creative and fun way, and how to apply those tools to find solutions to current real-world challenges

- Offers applications on iPads, Chromebooks and Apple TV, tied to student assessments
- **Established** a writing club, chess club, dare to dance, school newspaper, boys/girls on the run, art club, and student council
- Students also participate in recitals, technology showcases, art galleries, and community service projects

School-Wide Priorities

Francis Parker focuses on providing equitable opportunities to students using the Powerful Learning Framework. Essential elements of Powerful Learning are the following:

- Rigorous Academics holding our teaching and learning to the highest standard
- **Behavior supports** providing clear expectations and accountability for appropriate behavior all day, every day
- **Engaging Learning** exciting experiences allowing students to problem solve and work collaboratively with one another
- Authentic Relationships building solid understanding of students beyond their academics. Students, parents, community partners, teachers, and administrators are seen as one big family

Enhanced School Culture

• The school has established Community Houses; these houses provide smaller families of student within the school. Relationship building, celebration and a culture of excellence are common threads in each house.

Targeted Teacher Development

• Teachers participate in weekly professional learning opportunities in order to continue their growth. Each staff person at Francis Parker School No. 23 participates in a Shared Governance Team where he or she is able to focus their expertise and support the forward movement of the school community.

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Community Partners

School 23 works with community partners to enrich the educational experiences of its students, while continuing the strong commitment to academic excellence. Our community partnerships are structured in a way to provide students with off-campus learning experiences. Our partnership with the Memorial Art Gallery is an example of how we do things differently for our students. Students are provided the opportunity to learn onsite at the Memorial Art Gallery, where they can make connections between art and the learning at happening at the school.

Memorial Art Gallery

- Students in grades 1 through 4 visit the gallery for trips throughout the school year
- Students receive instruction from resident artists in drawing, painting and sculpting, create their own art projects, and host their own showing

Center for Youth

- The Center for Youth provide social-emotional supports to students during the instructional school day
- A "HelpZone" model has been established as a place for students to receive rapid support when they need it
