

Office of School Innovation

SY21-22

- School-based planning teams strengthen SCEPs using Data Wise
- Each school identifies 3 instructional teams aligned to the 3 commitments in their SCEP
- For each school, an individual is identified to develop expertise and build long-term capacity as an **improvement specialist**
- **Readiness**: purpose, process, and prework

SY22-23

- For each of the 46 schools, three teams engage in **improvement cycles aligned to SCEPs**, sharing evidence of progress with school-based planning teams
- Individuals identified as improvement specialists participate as learners, meeting prerequisites to enter Data Wise Coach Certification

SY23-24

- School-based planning teams assess and adjust SCEPs based on evidence
- Teams engage in a second improvement cycle aligned to SCEPs
- Individuals identified as improvement specialists develop and demonstrate competencies and earn Data Wise Coach Certification, co-leading workshops and coaching for school teams

Title I - Overview

The Rochester City School District was allocated \$26,389,952 to support Title I activities for the 2021-22 school year. Review of data show that Rochester students need support in the areas of academic growth and achievement and social-emotional development. To increase academic growth and achievement, the District provided:

- Out-of-school time intervention or acceleration programming
- Targeted interventions for at-risk students
- Increased access and support for digital learning
- Increased access to online recovery programs for secondary students
- Full-day kindergarten
- Supports for implementation of Next Generation Standards
- Coherence in progress monitoring of data





After School Acceleration Program (ASAP)

- The Afternoon School Acceleration Program provides direct service to 150 students
- ASAP helps students to obtain new credits, recover credits, and start and complete marking period recovery in order to graduate on time
- ASAP providing opportunities to take classes that do not fit in their schedule during the regular school day.

After School Acceleration Program (ASAP)


- Counselor and Administrators meet to recommend candidates for ASAP
- Counselors and Administrators continually review transcripts and report cards selecting students who need to recover credit and recover marking period grades, and also meet with students on an ongoing basis throughout the school year to offer accelerated courses to obtain new credit
- SPED, ENL/ESOL, and SEL support is provided

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Title III - Overview and Spenddown

In 2021-2022, the Rochester City School District (RCSD) anticipates serving approximately 3,800 English Language Learners (ELLs)/Multilingual Learners (MLs). Last year, RCSD students spoke more than 60 different languages and comprised 30% of the total District enrollment. Nearly two-thirds (62%) of the RCSD families who spoke a language other than English spoke Spanish. Somali (6%) moved up and became the next most common language, followed by Arabic (4%) and Nepali (4%). The District's Department of Bilingual Education & World Languages (BEWL) uses RCSD's Strategic Plan and CR Part 154 Corrective Action Plan to guide its work. The first priority of the District's Strategic Plan addresses the need to improve academic success for all Rochester students, with specific goals to increase the graduation rate and decrease the dropout rate for English Language Learners.





Summer Language Academy

Anna Madrid, Principal Analy Cruz-Phommany, Executive Director of BEWL

- Served 75 English Language Learners in Grades 6-8 enrolled in Bilingual and ENL programming across the district.
- Program focused on developing language and literacy skills through Project Based Learning grounded in science practices and middle school content.
- Title III Funded:
