Planning for Transition



What are Transition Services?

Transition services are activities that help your student prepare for goals after graduation. They help make plans for living, learning and earning after high school and may include activities to help develop skills for:

- Post-secondary education
- Career training
- Employment
- Adult services
- Independent living
- Community participation such as recreational, neighborhood living, and leisure activities

Why Plan for Transition?

Transition planning focuses attention on how the student's educational program can be planned to help the student make a successful transition for life after high school, including:

- Providing instruction and courses of study that are meaningful to the student's future and will motivate the student to complete his or her education;
- Teaching students skills and knowledge needed in adult life
- Providing links to adult agencies for a smooth transition

What is the IEP Transition Plan?

Once a year, at the Individualized Education Program (IEP) meeting, the IEP team will review the Transition Plan. The transition Plan is part of the IEP and includes the student's:

- Goals after graduation
- Interests, strengths, and career goals
- Activities the student can do to help him/ her reach goals in career, self-advocacy, and independent living
- Services that can help move the student towards desired goals
- Plans for after high school-further education/training and/or employment

What Age Does Transition Appear on the IEP?



Beginning with the IEP to

be in effect when a student is age 15, and updated annually, the IEP must include a statement of needed transition services and a statement of the responsibilities of the school district and when applicable, participating agencies for the provision of services and activities that promote movement from school to post-school opportunities, or both, before the student leaves the school setting.

Who Plans for Transition?

- Parents or guardians
- The student
- The school principal or designee
- The student's teachers
- Adult service agency representatives
 Other school staff, such as school counselor, related school and transition personnel

Preparing for Transition

The Student's Role:

- It is your future: You hold the key
- Share your dreams, goals, and needs
- Attend school every day
- Do your best every day
- Attend your IEP meeting and ask questions
- Use provided resources to achieve your goals
- Know the graduation requirements and diploma types
- Stay in school and graduate

The Family's Role:

- Help your child identify interests and abilities
- Help them stay on track with academic, work and life skills
- Support and encourage your child to accomplish his/ her goals
