SERVICES OFFERED:

As of July 2015, the University of Rochester serves as the Educational Partnership Organization (EPO) for East Upper and Lower Schools. Through various departments and programs the University of Rochester supports the East community. This partnership is designed to create a new East, encouraging a shift in school culture, enhancing academic programs, and increasing supports for scholars and staff. Be it by providing health-related care, instructional assistance for East staff, or moral encouragement and support for East's graduating scholars, the University of Rochester is invested in making the future of the East community *Ever Better*.



UNIVERSITY OF ROCHESTER MARAGRET WARNER SCHOOL OF EDUCATION



SERVICES OFFERED:

The University of Rochester's Margaret Warner School of Education is one of the main strategic partners for the educational partnership between the University of Rochester and East Upper and Lower Schools. Through its Center for Urban Education Success (CUES), the Warner School strives to employ its educational programs, efforts for community outreach, and research on urban schools to support the EPO's goals of encouraging a shift in school culture at East, enhancing its academic programs, and increasing supports for its scholars and staff. The Warner School supports a model for urban school improvement by providing East staff and faculty with guidance as it seeks to implement the use of "best practice" in school and district leadership, develop an effective curriculum, increase the social-emotional support available to East scholars, and enhance school and community partnerships.

The Warner School provides the East community with invaluable leadership and guidance as it works to uphold its mission to prepare all its scholars for a successful transition into adulthood.

SERVICES OFFERED:

At East, the University of Rochester's School of Nursing offers free and comprehensive physical and mental health services through the School-Based Health Center. The center is staffed and supported by nurse practitioners from the UR School of Nursing and physicians from the UR Medical Center. The School-Based Health Center provides physical and mental health assessments; diagnosis, treatment, and management of acute illnesses and injuries; management of chronic conditions; health screenings and education; and population-based primary prevention. East scholars also have access to an on-site pharmacy, where they can receive over-the-counter and prescription medications.

All scholars have access to this health care regardless of their ability to pay or health insurance status, and scholars incur no out-of-pocket expenses. A signed parental consent form is required for all services except reproductive health and mental health care. Scholars are able to access care through the School-Based Health Center whenever school is in session; after hours, by calling (585) 435-2332; and during summer and school vacation by setting up an appointment.

SERVICES OFFERED:

East is a site for one of the University of Rochester's Eastman Dental Center's satellite dental clinics, the SMILEmobile. Through the Division of Community Dentistry, the SMILEmobile provides East scholars in grades 6-12 with complete dental check-ups and necessary dental treatment. The SMILEmobile visits East every couple of Fridays.

The SMILEmobile primarily serves scholars who qualify for Medicaid and Child Health Plus. Any scholar interested in accessing the SMILEmobile's dental services can pick up the Children's Dental Health Service Application in the Main Office. The application must be completed and signed by the scholar's parent or guardian and returned to the Main Office.

SERVICES OFFERED:

The University of Rochester's David T. Kearns Center offers a number of Pre-College Programs to support scholars for their colleges and careers.

- 1.) The College Prep Center, in room B110-A, provides academic, college, and career advising; college application assistance; and SAT/ACT registration and preparation.
- 2.) In addition to what the College Prep Center provides, the Talent Search program offers assistance with financial aid and scholarship applications, a tutoring program, cultural events, and college visits and tours.
- 3.) In addition to what the College Prep Center and Talent Search program provides, the Upward Bound program offers STEM internships, Saturday enrichment, and a Summer program at the University of Rochester.

These three programs are scaffolded. Any scholar may utilize the College Prep Center, but the Talent Search and Upward Bound programs are based on an application process.

SERVICES OFFERED:

The University of Rochester's Center for Human Athleticism Musculoskeletal Performance and Prevention (CHAMPP) implements a cost-free program of scholastic athletic training, tutoring, nutrition, and mentoring. This program brings together scholar athletes, coaches, and educational and medical professionals to enhance athletic performance, predict and prevent injury, and improve overall wellness and academic success of 13 to 18 year-old scholar athletes.

CHAMPP's program is an intense 10-week training for scholar athletes at East, based on rolling admission. Scholar athletes receive physical athletic training, an independent study period with tutors, and nutrition for performance, recovery, and overall health. The goal is to help scholars perform better both in the classroom and on the field in a pre-collegiate setting.

SERVICES OFFERED:

The Family and Community Engagement (FACE) Committee is a group of East administrators, teachers, collaborative partners, and parents that advocates FOR the inclusion of families and the community as partners in scholar's learning and development. The FACE Committee is jointly made up of East's Parent-Teacher Organization (PTO), a democratically elected body of parents that advocates for parent voice in school decision making and processes. Together, the FACE Committee and the PTO believe that families are equal partners in a scholar's education. By working with families, communities, and schools, FACE works to reconceptualize understandings of family engagement by creating meaningful, authentic, and organic opportunities for shared decision making. When families are strengthened and connected to their communities, they take the lead in improving the quality of their lives and the lives of others.

To accomplish its mission, FACE supports multiple events throughout the year. From parent-teacher and scholar-led conferences, to family dinner nights, to parent workshops, to open houses, and cultural heritage nights, there are many ways for the East community to become active participants in the school. It is FACE's belief that the more involved families and communities are in their schools, the stronger the outcome for scholars.

SERVICES OFFERED:

The Center for Youth serves East scholars grades 6-12. Through the Scholar and Family Support Center, the Center for Youth provides East scholars with crisis intervention, prevention counseling, mediation, mentoring, job readiness, clothing/food assistance, help with runaway/homeless issues, referrals to community agencies, and drop-in services. Furthermore, drug prevention workshops are offered in an effort to support scholars affected by substance abuse and to help them increase their protective factors. Emphasis is placed on stress management and increasing effective communication skills.

All scholars of East are eligible to schedule an appointment or drop in during their lunch periods. All individual appointments are based on scholars' schedules as to not remove them from core classes.

SERVICES OFFERED:

The Cool-Down Room (Eagle's Nest):

This setting is a temporary option for Lower School scholars who need a supportive location to process an incident/event. Scholars may be directed by their administrator to the cool-down room for up to a period and they do not typically receive additional consequences unless they have difficulty in the room. Center for Youth staffers Erin Blackburn and Deontae Maclachan coordinate activities in the Cool-Down room. The cool-down room's extension is x4400.

Alternative to Suspension-ATS (A115):

Staffed by a Center for Youth employee and Mr. Jeremy Smith, ATS is a short-term, in-school program for Lower School scholars that serves as a consequence for a wide variety of conduct issues. Scholars may be assigned for as little as 1 period, or for as many as 5 days, depending on the severity of the offense, and will receive academic, social, and behavioral support during their stay.

SERVICES OFFERED:

The Champion Academy is a program founded by East alumni and Super Bowl champion Roland Williams. The Champion Academy offers a strategic blend of program elements that align with the cultural and generational needs of its students. Program implementation caters to the multiple-intelligences of each individual student.

Champion Academy Program Elements:

- Summer Orientation A mandatory ten day introduction to program principles.
- E-Mentorship An online system for students to interact with each other and educational content.
- Monthly Meetups Each month, all members come together for a week of after-school support.
- Community Service Members learn civic responsibility by serving 10 hours of community service.
- Daily Motivation Each academic day, members receive a motivation phone call at 6:15 a.m.
- Classroom Checkups During the academic year, volunteers from the community help hold students accountable to their academic and citizenship goals. Volunteers visit schools and sit in for one class period to observe members in their classroom environment.
- Extra-Curricular Activities Members participate in the school's extracurricular activities.
- Strategic Incentives Outstanding members are incentivized through recognition and rewards.
- Health & Fitness Education Members receive fitness training, health tips, and nutrition education.
- Parent Support Parents of members have a support group that offers personal development workshops, financial literacy training, job opportunities and other resources.
- Exposure Opportunities Members are exposed to difference by taking monthly local trips.
- Member Accountability Each member is assigned a Member Accountability Coach that works closely with teachers, administrators, parents and community stakeholders to encourage and hold them accountable to accomplish their goals.
- Community Collaboration The Champion Academy currently collaborates with more than 20 community-based organizations across the region interested in helping teens in poverty succeed.

Students can join the program by being referred by an adult.

SERVICES OFFERED:

Connected Communities is a non-profit public/private collaboration of neighborhood, business, government and non-profit leaders partnering with residents to address the various needs of the EMMA and Beechwood communities through the implementation of a holistic approach.

Our mission is to break the cycle of poverty and revitalize the EMMA and Beechwood neighborhoods in Rochester, NY. SERVICES OFFERED:

Step to College is a college preparatory program administered by East EPO with the mission of preparing participating scholars for admission to and success in two-year and four-year colleges following high school graduation.

Program goals are:

- 1. To provide scholars with rigorous academics and experiences to prepare for college life
- 2. For scholars to be socially-emotionally healthy
- 3. For scholars to successfully transition from high school to a two-year or four-year college
- 4. For scholars to develop character traits supportive of long-term achievement
- 5. To create a "college going" culture at East EPO

Program services include:

- 1. Four year Academic Boot Camp Immersion Program
 - Scholars stay overnight on a college campus for two weeks over the summer
 - Scholars take classes on campus from K-12 and college instructors with curriculum focused on reading, writing, math, and science
 - Scholars learn about the college application process, financial assistance, and college life
- 2. Ongoing support during the academic year
 - Monthly advisement meetings
 - Quarterly reviews with counselors and scholars
 - Workshops, recreational activities, and college tours
 - Structured study halls and tutoring
 - Mentorship
 - Job placement opportunities through partnerships with the Summer of Opportunity Program and Wegmans Work-Scholarship Program

Program eligibility is based on recommendation for scholars transitioning from their 8th to 9th grade. Once enrolled in the program, scholars continue participation until graduation.

SERVICES OFFERED:

In partnership with *EnCompass: Resources for Learning*, East developed Quest, an alternative, on-site program for East scholars in grades 9-12 that focuses on credit recovery and academic counseling. There are three parts to the Quest program: Quest 1.0, Quest 2.0, and Quest 3.0.

Quest 1.0 follows East scholars who completed their freshman year with an insufficient amount of credits (less than 2), and provides extra support for accelerated credit recovery, comprised of smaller class sizes, alternatively designed curricular content, and Regents review and strategies. Quest 1.0 scholars are equipped with crucial strategies for time management, note taking, test taking, and other critically useful skills for academic success. Through Quest 1.0, East scholars who have fallen behind academically are able to complete 2 years worth of credits in a single year.

Quest 2.0 provides services to Quest 1.0 scholars who have achieved 6 or more credits. Quest 2.0 scholars have a blended schedule of compressed credit recovery with both Quest and East classes. EnCompass supports these scholars with attendance, academics, and regents preparation.

Quest 3.0supports students who are now seniors and attending general East classes. EnCompass staff push into these classes, following the scholars for academic support and attendance, and preparing them for regents exams. These students have a goal for graduation in December, June, or August.

SERVICES OFFERED:

East's food and resource pantry (located in room B114-B) serves scholars facing food or resource insecurity with emergency food and hygiene supplies. The pantry's supplies are acquired through donations and grant funding. A partnership with Foodlink assists with a reliable source of healthy and affordable food.

Scholars needing services from the pantry may be referred or self-refer. In the pantry, scholars choose food and hygiene supplies that they need in a supermarket-selection style. There are bags available for them to take items home in. Additionally, the pantry also provides healthy recipes, nutritional information, and a list of other food pantries around Rochester.

The pantry is open during school hours Monday-Friday from 8:00 a.m.—4:00p.m., or by appointment.

SERVICES OFFERED:

Hillside Work-Scholarship Connection (HW-SC) serves scholars grades 10-12 and offers services in mentoring, job training, job placement, tutoring, post-secondary support, and summer enrichment programs. Scholars can get involved in after-school life-skill enrichment programs, tutoring, job training, HW-SC summer programming, and 1:1 mentoring and consultation for post-secondary planning with a youth advocate and/or a HW-SC career specialist.

Youth advocates are available for crisis intervention during school, after school, and on-call on the weekends. Some programming may occur during the weekends. Youth advocates also connect with parents via phone calls and home visits at times deemed most convenient by both parties.

SERVICES OFFERED:

ReInvesting in Youth offers services in Juvenile Justice Diversion for East scholars with high truancy and/or behavioral referrals up to and including adjudicated PINS or JD status. Services include strength-based, asset-driven case management, community asset navigation, academic support and intervention as well as access to evidence-based pregnancy prevention training. Scholars are required to attend bi-monthly Family CORE meetings and engage with a team on a weekly basis.

ReInvesting in Youth serves 11-17 year-old students. Scholars must have referrals with consent from parents, FACT, Probation, or school. Scholars must also live in the RCSD catchment. Enrollment is based on availability.

SERVICES OFFERED:

The Family Service Assistant (FSA) program strives to build partnerships with families that will increase parent participation in scholar education and school related events, encourage membership in FACE and school-based planning, increase home/ school positive and pro-active communications, and increase linkages to community resources. At East, the FSA team works directly with the parent/ guardian to support the scholars' academic needs. Family Service Assistants receive referrals of scholars in grades 6-12. Each FSA conducts home visits, completes family assessments, assists families with prioritizing goals, and provides families with community referrals when necessary. Other services include: providing monthly parent workshops, linking parents to FACE meetings and different activities throughout the school year, along with connecting parents to parent teacher conferences (PTC) and providing transportation to these services when needed.

All scholar referrals must be submitted to the Family Service Assistant Coordinator (FSAC) through the Scholar and Family Support Center (SFSC; see page 10) office for any scholar that may have low parent involvement, known barriers or challenges in the home, low attendance, and academic and/or behavioral concerns. Once a scholar referral has been received, an FSA is assigned to each scholar referral case. Contact is then made with the parent/guardian through phone calls and/or home visits in order to establish a time to meet and discuss ways the program, parent, school, and community can work together to support the scholar to achieve academic success.

SERVICES OFFERED:

The Proyecto Ayuda Outreach (PAO) Program is designed to help youth who are at risk of substance abuse or who are already abusing drugs and/or alcohol. At East, the program offers parent and youth workshops, evidence-based curriculum for classes, individualized prevention counseling for youth, and outreach. Parent/Youth Workshops are geared toward prevention and healthy alternatives and are based on the needs of the group. The evidence-based curriculum offered by this program is called Too Good For Drugs (TGFD) and is a 10 week program with 1-hour session lengths. TGFD teaches scholars how to be socially competent and autonomous problem solvers. TGFD focuses on developing personal and interpersonal skills to resist peer pressures, goal setting, decision making, bonding with others, having respect for yourself and others, managing emotions, and effective communication and social interactions. The program also provides information about the negative consequences of drug use and the benefits of a nonviolent, drug-free lifestyle.

Scholars can access the PAO services through, a scholar referral, which must be submitted to the Scholar and Family Support Center (SFSC) coordinator and then to the PAO staff. The SFSC coordinator can also submit referrals for prevention counseling, case management, and workshops. Once the scholar referral has been received, a PAO counselor is assigned to the scholar referred. Times are scheduled with the youth according to his or her need and class schedule.

SERVICES OFFERED:

LawNY offers free civil legal services to scholars and families. Services include legal assistance with issues related to housing, income maintenance, consumer credit issues, access to health insurance, and employment barriers due to a conviction record. LawNY can also refer scholars or family members to other civil legal service providers in the Telesca Center for Justice.

LawNY is on-site at East on Thursdays.

SERVICES OFFERED:

The Family Access and Connection Team (FACT) is an asset-based referral program that offers support to scholars in the PINS (Persons in Need of Supervision) system and their families. East scholars who exhibit harmful behaviors, including violence towards self and/or others, theft, substance abuse, and truancy, qualify to receive support from the FACT.

Through the FACT, scholars receive regular needs assessments, behavior and attendance monitoring, service coordination, and program referrals as needed at school and/or within the community.

SERVICES OFFERED:

MCC's Liberty Partnerships Program (LPP) is a pre-collegiate program that provides academic support and career/college preparation to East scholars in grades 7-12. LPP offers case management services, after school tutoring, personal support/counseling, career exploration and post-secondary planning, including college preparation. Scholars can also receive 1:1 advisement, attend workshops, and go on college tours.

During school breaks and throughout the summer, LPP offers East scholars leadership opportunities, community service projects, and a wide variety of field trips to places such as the Corning Museum of Glass, the Naval & Military Park, Niagara Power Vista, and Stony Brook State Park. Scholars can also go on trips to NYS colleges.

In order to qualify for services, East scholars must be considered "at-risk" of dropping out of school. These risk factors include poor grades, low attendance, behavior issues, negative change in family circumstances, a family history of dropping out, a history of child abuse/neglect, teen pregnancy/parenting, negative peer pressure, and language barriers. East scholars can access services by having their parent/guardian complete the registration forms. Once enrolled in the program, scholars can utilize the 1:1 advisement and/or counseling services, and attend tutoring sessions (offered two days a week after school at East), workshops, and field trips. Parent-focused events are also offered and program staff make regular contact (through phone calls, emails, and home visits) with families.

SERVICES OFFERED:

Urban League's GEAR UP (Gaining Early Awareness and Readiness for Undergraduate Programs) program offers academic support, SAT/ACT preparation, and opportunities for community engagement and college and career exploration. Scholars can take advantage of tutoring and homework assistance, mentoring and counseling services, college tours, parent and family engagement activities, and PSAT/SAT/ACT preparation courses.

Services are offered to the entire 12th grade cohort (Class of 2020) during lunch periods and after school at East EPO. College tours, family engagement activities, and other special events are offered on selected Saturdays. In order to take part in GEAR UP activities, scholars are required to have two of the following risk factors: low socio-economic status, failing grades in core subjects, low state examination scores, school suspensions, being over-age for grade level, and low school attendance.

SERVICES OFFERED:

Urban League's Pathways to Justice Careers Program offers services designed for youth to graduate from high school and enter the growing emergency services and social justice fields. Students age 16-21 who are currently enrolled in a high school program and who have been involved with or are at risk of being involved with the justice system are eligible for participation in the program.

The Villa of Hope provides therapeutic services to scholars in East Upper and Lower Schools in order to address mental health issues, family issues, behavior, or other identified issues. Scholars meet with their assigned therapist on a weekly basis or as needed.
