
How do informational texts build my understanding about slavery in the United States?



Quick Review -Things Close Readers Do ...



- ► Read with a PURPOSE!
- ▶ Get the *gist* figure out what the text is mostly about
- ▶ Re-read
- ► Annotate!!!!
- ► Cite evidence
- Use details from the text to make inferences
- Use context clues to figure out word meanings
- ► Answer the writing prompt based on the text





Well-developed paragraph checklist:


- ☐ Answer the questions in the task above
- ☐State the topic and <u>your claim</u> statement about the topic in your introductory sentence
- ☐ Cite the *strongest* three (3) pieces of evidence to support **your claim**
- □ Analyze evidence in order to make connections to **your claim**
- ☐ Use a concluding statement
