PROGRAM CRITERIA

Student must:

- Be a Rochester City School District student entering grade 10 in the upcoming school year.
- Be in good standing in both academics and attendance.
- Be passing all core courses.
- Submit a parental consent form.
- Submit two letters of recommendation (one from a teacher or administrator at their school/one from a community member).
- Participate in a program orientation.
- Obtain a counselor sign off to verify they are on track towards meeting graduation requirements.

CAREERS WITHIN THE CAREER.

Public safety careers open doors to a wide range of specialized fields, or opportunities for a "career within a career." Firefighters can become experts in emergency first aid or swift-water rescue for instance. Police Officers can aspire to join the Mounted Patrol or work in the K-9 unit. And the workers in the 911 emergency call center can become experts in telecommunications technology and drive changes in the industry. EMT's can become paramedics or pursue careers in medicine such as nursing or physician.

ROCHESTER CITY SCHOOL DISTRICT **Public Safety Course Descriptions**

9132PS - CPPS- Intro to Public Safety Credits: 2.0 Course Credit INTRO Prerequisite: NA

COURSE **Course Description:** Required students application and criteria for this program. This course is a prerequisite for Law Enforcement, CPPS Firefighting & Protection, EMS/EMT, and Emergency Communications pathways. This course is an introduction to basic law enforcement, public safety, emergency medical services and fire science with an emphasis in urban emergency situations. In the first year, students explore these professions through a variety of guest lecturers and site visitations. Students select an area of concentration for the second year of the program.

9135 - CPPS-Firefighter I Credits: 2.0 Course Credit Prerequisite: 9132 - CPPS-Intro to Public Safety

Course Description: A basic survey course of the entire medium of fire protection, fire prevention, and fire extinguishment. The application of scientific principles to the studies of fire protection technology and the development of career positions in the discipline for the individual are important goals in this course. Students also receive training on how to prepare for a civil service exam successfully.

9136 - CPPS - Emergency Comm. 9-1-1 Credits: 2.0 Course Credit

Prerequisite: 9132 - CPPS-Intro to Public Safety

Course Description: This is the core foundational course of the Emergency Telecommunications program. Students gain the skills and knowledge necessary to access, control and prioritize calls from the community. Students will practice these skills in conjunction with emergency communications hardware and software in a realistic laboratory experience.

9133 - CPPS-Law Enforcement I Credits: 2.0 Course Credit Prerequisite: 9132 - CPPS-Intro to Public Safety

Course Description: This course will cover topics such as methods of criminal investigation, national crime rate statistics, criminal law terms, examining policing in multicultural communities, learning the standards required for police recruitment and retention, responsibilities of specialized units in law enforcement, becoming knowledgeable about police discretion and behavior, learning about advancements in technologies in solving crimes (DNA), crime scene investigations, search and seizure procedures, vehicle searches, physical fitness training, role playing in different scenarios, guest speakers from law enforcement agencies on their responsibilities and legal jurisdictions and equipment used by police officers.

9134 - CPPS-Emergency Medical Services I Credits: 2.0 Course Credit

Prerequisite: 9132 - CPPS-Intro to Public Safety

Course Description: This course is for nonambulance professional rescuers who are first to arrive at an emergency medical scene to provide pre hospital care. The Certified First Responder uses a limited amount of equipment to perform initial assessment and intervention and is trained to assist and work side by side with other EMS providers. Topics covered are patient assessment, CPR review, airway, shock, wound management, full body immobilization, and initial treatment for other medical emergencies. Students successfully completing this course are eligible for New York State Department of Health Certified First Responder certification.

Response (AMR) is the City of Rochester's emergency medical services
