




Important Updates on Senior Class

We are on a 4-month countdown to graduation for the class of 2019. While not all of us work directly with seniors, graduation rate is a critical measure of our school's success and obviously critical to each young person. While many students are sitting pretty for graduation, there are a large number of students with significant needs that we must meet in order for them to graduate. A few facts to keep in mind:



- ➤ Our target for graduation rate is **60%.** This would be a substantial gain over last year's 54.5%.
- ➤ There are 159 students in this cohort (it fluctuates); 139 students are still active; 113 attend on campus, 15 attend other programs. The rest have dropped out, or are no-shows—both of which count against us.
- The chart below shows how we have assessed the students, based on their credits, exams, current grades, attendance, and overall context. You can see that to reach our target graduation rate, we need to support every yellow and orange student to graduation by August.



- GRADUATION MENTORS: We are looking for mentors for about 45 students
 who need significant support and a creative, loving cheerleader. Please
 watch for and respond to Ms. Pryor's email requesting mentors.
- **SKILLS USA EXAM**: One of the pathways that students can use to graduate includes passing a career employability exam (SkillsUSA) in place of one of

the Social Studies Regents. Students have to have sat for both exams, and have to complete some online course work in order to sit for the SkillsUSA. All seniors who need this exam will be excused from 2.5 days of classes to take this exam. They will be in **SkillsUSA** workshops on March 12th from 9:30 – 3:30, March 13th from 9:30 – 1:00, and then take the exam on March 14th. Please watch for an email with the list of students.

Senior Supports: Students have a variety of very individual needs—including credit recovery, exam prep, tutoring, lab minutes, mental health, attendance, etc., etc. As we come into the home stretch, we will be working closely with you all about setting up viable personalized options. Thank you in advance for always partnering to provide opportunities for students—which we know can be frustrating and time-consuming on the adult end!

Reminders about Cell Phone Policy and Procedure

We welcome the new team (plus some faithful year-rounders!) to cell phone collection and distribution this semester. We are grateful and ask that you let us know if you see issues, so that we can all get better. A couple of notes and thank yous:

- o **Ms. Whaley** comes in early every single morning and singlehandedly sets up the morning bins and tables. It is NOT overlooked and is very much appreciated.
- o **Ms. Blythe** is another powerhouse on the phones, pitching in much more than her assigned times to help colleagues and our school.
- o **9th period teachers**—PLEASE keep your envelopes alphabetized as you distribute phones. You really can't imagine how much smoother it goes during morning collection and early dismissals.
- o **9th period teachers**—no matter what time the bins come to your classroom, please do not distribute phones until 3:25. We are starting to see students taking walks with phones as early as 3:00. This poses safety risks and does not maintain a culture where every minute matters.
- o No system is perfect and it is adolescents' job to be creative and persistent in skirting rules. We are working with the safety and security staff and we ask that you continue to alert an SSO, PPR or an administrator if you know a student has a phone. We have to be together on this to keep it up!

Black History Month

School Climate Survey

Every District employee and student has been sent a link to a school climate survey. This is part of the federal education law (ESSA) and each school will receive a climate index, based on the survey results.

- ✓ Survey is live from February 25 through Friday, April 5.
- ✓ You should have received an email on Monday, February 25, from <u>SchoolClimateSurvey@rcsdk12.org</u> with the subject line, "School Climate Survey."
- All students received a link. We are asking all English teachers to make sure that students have 30 minutes devoted to completing the survey, before the April 5 deadline. It is important that students receive ample time to complete the survey in one sitting; there is no way to pause and resume the survey at another time.
