Spotlight on Electives

What's happening in electives?

In Urban Poetry, we have been learning about the history of hip hop, and students have been intrigued to discover rap music's origins at South Bronx neighborhood parties in the early 70s. We have taken a close look at some of the key people and their contributions from the early days (DJ Kool Herc, Afrika Bambaataa, Fab Five Freddy) and recently analyzed some influential songs of the 70s and early 80s including: "The Revolution Will Not Be Televised," by Gil Scot-Heron; "Rapper's Delight" by The Sugarhill Gang; and "The Message" by Grandmaster Flash and the Furious Five. We will be working our way through the decades, looking at key voices, texts, and genres. Much of the music comes onto the scene with energy and creativity as well as controversy, providing an opportunity for rich discussions about language, resistance, social justice, violence, truth and beauty. -Ms. Railey, Teacher

Public Speaking has been focusing on developing skills for four types of presentations: informative speech, persuasive speech, instruction (teaching a mini-lesson) and performance (usually a monologue). Each marking period, students read and watch a variety of speeches that fall into the corresponding categories for purposes of analysis and awareness of technique. The course relies heavily on reflection of the students' process of selecting topics, creating materials and developing presentation skills. -Mr. Savastano, Teacher

In IB art class the Juniors are finishing up their critical investigation unit. Each student researched an artist, artwork, genre, or artifact of their choice and created a piece of artwork based on their investigation. Every student chooses the media and subject matter that they work in, which makes a lively classroom. Projects are ranging from drawings and painting to conceptual sculpture to ceramics. Meanwhile, the IB seniors are nearing the end of their IBVA journey and are finished artworks for their upcoming art exhibition. **The 2023 opening of the IB art exhibition will be Thursday, April 13th from 5-6:30.** We hope to see you there! -Mrs. Curtice, Teacher

9th graders are learning about foreground, middleground, and background. We began with some simple landscape drawing. We are just completing our watercolor, using value with hatching and cross-hatching with a black pen. Our 3D students have just completed paper maiche letters. They built then, added 3 layers of paper maiche, primed them, and turned them into sweets and fruit and animals. Our 2 D&P class has just finished a monochromatic landscape painting lessons. Computer Tech 10

This class is designed to give students a glimpse into the courses offered in depth Junior and Senior year. We are currently wrapping up our unit on College/Career/Work that focuses on the student. We started the journey reaching out to the academic counselors for transcripts and finding out what each individual graduation path looks like for the student. Then it was on to researching careers, interests, colleges, apprenticeships and more. As we are wrapping this up we are looking at financial planning and finances in general. We just finished the last pieces of our wrap up, how to request a recommendation from someone, complete the forms for a work permit, applications, and the required hiring forms (I9 and W4). Our next adventure is Graphics. This unit focuses on developing an eye for photography and learning Photoshop for photo editing. -Ms. Reyes, Teacher

Virtual Media

This class has been developing their skills with the Adobe Creative Suite. We started with Vector graphics and learning Adobe Illustrator, we then built on those skills learning elements of color and design principles to create original designs. We are currently wrapping up sound editing and mixing using Adobe Audition and Soundtrap to create soundtracks. Next up is learning and developing skills using Adobe Animate, this is where they will be able to integrate all the things they have learned to create their own original animations with sound. -Ms. Reyes, Teacher

Journalism

This class is focusing on developing multiple media projects that showcase Journalism in the 21st century. Initially we looked at the evolution of journalism and how media has transformed with the technology that has made everyone a potential journalist. From the food blogger to the tweets, YouTube to 24-hour news. Learning to research deeper into subjects, connect ideas to create new stories and then how-to best report what you have learned. Sometimes it will be a full news article, it could be a VLOG, Blog or even an informational poster. Currently we are working finding current events to research that may have the potential to be more than just new for a minute. This marking period we are working on point of view, editorials and opinion. Students then are creating/recording their videos, laying out their print articles using Canva and Adobe InDesign and editing their images with Adobe Photoshop and PixlrE. -Ms. Reyes, Teacher
