<b>4 - cuatro</b>	(four)	<b>14 - catorce</b>	(fourteen)
<b>5 - cinco</b>	(five)	<b>15 - quince</b>	(fifteen)
<b>6 - seis</b>	(six)	<b>16 - dieciséis</b>	(sixteen)
<b>7 - siete</b>	(seven)	<b>17 - diecisiete</b>	(seventeen)
