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Improving Early Learning Programs is a Priority at State and Local Levels submitted by Dr. Robin Hooper

Improving the coordination and quality with the longitudinal data system proof early learning was a priority for State Education Commissioner John B. King, the Board of the Regents, the Early Childhood Advisory Council, the Office of Early Learning and a variety of advocacy and stakeholder groups as they worked to submit the Early Learning Challenge Grant last month. The Board of Regents directed State Education Department officials to develop a Determination of Kindergarten Readiness tool for implementation in 2014-15. The Board charged the State Education Department with the creation of a Kindergarten Readiness Advisory Council made up of expert stakeholders to develop the assessment. This assessment will provide a common baseline measure for entering kindergarten students. Readiness findings will not be used to prevent a child's entry into kindergarten, to place them in special education or make other high stakes decisions such as evaluating teacher effectiveness. This low stakes assessment coupled

posed in the ELC grant application has potential to support improvements in prekindergarten and kindergarten programs across the state.

The Board of Regents also approved the New York State Prekindergarten Foundation for the Common Core Standards during October. This final approved version of the New York State Prekindergarten Standards incorporating the Common Core Standards for Prekindergarten will be used as our benchmark in our implementation of the High Scope Preschool Curriculum. During November the Office of Early Learning will be finalizing the New York State **Education Department Assessment** Guidance for Early Learning focused on prekindergarten through Grade 3. These new initiatives from our State Education Department will quide our development as we work toward continuous improvement of our prekindergarten programs through collaboration with families, staff and community partners.

They were telling stories about their zoo animals climbing mountains to get to the party. Knowing that this group is very sensory driven was helpful in planning for them.

The Early Childhood Department will be providing a half day session presented by High/Scope Consultants on November 8 at the Strong Museum. Participants will choose to attend the morning session from 8:30 until 11:30 or the afternoon session from 12:30 until 3:30. The topic for the day is "Adult-Child Interaction Strategies to help Scaffold Learning." This session will examine methods of interacting with children, including conversational techniques that support children's learning throughout the day.

Throughout the year, there will be 5 additional required trainings for all UPK teachers. These will be offered with a choice of 6 different times for each as follows:

District Wide Professional Development



At our recent District-Wide meeting, teachers learned a chant using the "Separation" method suggested in the High/Scope Teaching Model. Here. the movements of a song are taught before the words, or vice versa. It is easier for to children to learn if we use only one presentation

modality at a time, in this case, first the visual (demonstration), then the auditory (saying or singing the words). Children can feel successful just by doing the movements, even if they can't sing all the words to a particular song. For more information, see the High/Scope book, Movement Plus Rhymes, Songs, and Singing Games. submitted by M'Lou Speranza

In addition to M'Lou's transition stretch, we examined the new indicator "0" on the COR, and how we use the COR anecdotal notes to plan. In small groups we participated in activities using the book, COR: What's Next. Teachers discovered new ways to use this practical resource.

Please note that the sequence of the topics listed above has changed. Our next topic for the November District Wide meetings is Emergent Literacy: Phonemic Awareness, Phonological Awareness. At the time that this was written, the details have not been finalized. The planning team is likely to draw on a couple of the resources all of our UPK classes were given this past spring: Fee, Fie, Phonemic Awareness and Let's Talk Literacy.
