CHOOSING A HIGH SCHOOL IS IMPORTANT

Having progressed through the elementary and middle grades, students have the chance to explore their individual talents and interests-to develop the skills and academic knowledge that prepare them for success in college and careers. This booklet provides information on Rochester high schools, each of which provides unique opportunities and programs to match a range of student needs.

Enrollment in 9th grade – here's how it works

- If your 8th-grade student attends a school that offers 9th grade and does not want to change, you do not need to complete an application. Your child will automatically be enrolled at his or her current school.
- If your 8th-grade student wants or needs a new school, you have a wide range of choices. Your child is eligible to attend any District school that offers 9th grade, but you must apply on or before March 27, 2020. Please review this booklet for details about our schools and the selection process.

Parents of incoming 9th-graders should identify the schools they most want their child to attend, ranking their top five choices on the online application, www.rcsdk12.org/register.

Students are assigned to the available seats in a school through the lottery process. Four important facts to consider:

- Two schools have a separate application process: School of the Arts and School Without Walls. If you are interested in School of the Arts, please call the school by December 13 to obtain the application if you did not receive it in the mail. Once your application is returned, the school will contact you with an audition/interview date and time.
- If you are interested in School Without Walls, watch for a separate mailing explaining what you need to do to apply to this school. If you do not receive the mailing by December 18, please call the school to request the mailing and to schedule a visit and interview.
- One school requires an additional step in the lottery process: Wilson Magnet High School. Your child will need to write an original essay if Wilson is your first choice lottery school. Please call the school if you are interested in Wilson Magnet AND make Wilson your first choice on the online application.
- Most high schools expect families to visit the school and all schools expect parents and students to sign a compact agreement with the school before the March 27 deadline. Some schools also conduct interviews with students and/or parents. You will have a much better chance of attending your first choice school if you meet these expectations.

School Selection at a Glance

- Step 1: Learn about your school options.
- **Step 2:** Rank your school selections.
- Step 3: Complete the compact. If you are not able to visit a school, compacts

and detailed school information are available at the Student Placement Office.

- Step 4: Apply by online March 27 at www.rcsdk12.org/register.
- Step 5: If you are considering School of the Arts as one of your choices, apply directly to the school by December 13. If you apply to SOTA, you need to also complete as Online Application for your remaining choices.

You will be notified of your 9th-grade placement in May. Students accepted by School of the Arts can choose admission to that school or enroll in their lottery placement school.

Students who do not participate in the School Choice Lottery by March 27 will be placed in a school where space is available after the selection process is complete.

What is a school compact?

A school compact is one- or two-page form that outlines each school's expectations and requirements. Typical points addressed in compacts include adherence to the District's Code of Conduct, academic expectations, special orientation or learning time requirement, and school policies, such as cell phone rules or dress code.

While compacts are not legal requirements, students and parents are expected to understand and agree to the school's expectations. The compact process encourages families to visit schools and meet with administrators before making their top choices.

How the lottery works

A computer assigns a random number to each student who applies to the lottery. There is no preference to applications submitted early. Students are placed in their first-choice schools based on their lottery number until seats are filled. Students who have completed the school's compact expectations will be considered for placement before other students. East Lower School also places a priority on students who live near the school. This process continues until all students have been placed. Every student is enrolled in the school as close as possible to his or her top choice.

Play the lottery smart!

- Complete the compact expectations of your top-choice school.
- If you apply to School of the Arts, you must participate in the lottery also, so that you get one of your school choices if you do not gain admission to SOTA.
- The lottery gives every family a fair chance, so if you have a strong interest in a particular school, you should always make it your first choice. However, understand that schools with a 6th grade will have fewer open seats. If you're equally interested in more than one school, you might think about which school is likely to have the most open seats and choose that first. You could ask about open seats when you go on your school tour.

Does every student in 8th grade need to choose a new school?

If your 8th-grade student attends a school that offers 9th grade and does not want to change schools, you do not need to complete an application. Your child will automatically be enrolled at his or her current school.

If your 8th-grade student wants or needs a new school, you have a wide range of choices. Your child is eligible to attend any RCSD school that offers 9th grade, but you must complete an application to participate in the School Choice Lottery on or before March 27, 2020.

When is the application deadline?

In order to participate in the School Choice Lottery, you must apply on or before March 27, 2020.

What are my chances of getting my first choice school?

Students who participate in the lottery have consistently received their first choice school between 75% and 85% of the time. You must apply by March 27, 2020.

What happens to students who do not apply by March 27, 2020?

Students who do not participate in the lottery are placed in a school where space is available after the selection process is complete.

What happens if my selected schools closes before the 2020-21 school year?

Occasionally, the District or the State decides that a school does not have the academic performance to remain open. Sometimes the facility is no longer adequate to meet the academic standards of the cutting edge technology expected to be delivered to today's students.

- If the lottery process has not begun, you will be asked to resubmit your school choices.
- If the lottery program is already in motion, that school will be removed from your selection, and your other rankings will move forward in order. In other words, if your first choice school closes, your second choice school becomes your first choice.

Services include immunizations, physical exams, blood work, reproductive health, treatment of injuries or illnesses, prescriptions for minor conditions, and counseling for behavioral health issues.



Expanded learning time extends learning time beyond the traditional school day and school year to provide broader, more enriching learning experiences for students.



Community schools act as a hub, offering a coordinated approach to connect and cultivate assets in the community and to link families to services, so that educators can focus on teaching and students can focus on learning.

Athletics Program

The District's Interscholastic Sports Program offers opportunities for all students to participate in competitive sports at the modified, freshman, junior varsity, and varsity levels. Student athletes are provided opportunities for physical exams and must be re-qualified by a nurse or doctor prior to each season.

The sports program supports academic achievement by emphasizing the following eligibility requirements. Student athletes must:

- Maintain at least a C average in all subjects
- Maintain 90% daily attendance in each class
- Demonstrate good citizenship

Student eligibility is assessed at each school by the Athletic Department.

Schools that do not offer or have accommodations for a specific sport at their school location may have that offering in conjunction with another school. A full list of sports and their locations by school is available in the back of this booklet.



Career and Technical Education (CTE)

Career and Technical Education (CTE) provides students with the knowledge and training necessary to succeed as life long learners in future careers. CTE prepares students to be college and career ready by providing core and academic skills, employability skills, and technical, job-specific skills. Career and Technical Education transitions students to workforce development, career exploration, applied academics, and post-secondary education. The Rochester City School District has a total of fourteen New York State approved Career and Technical Education programs. Students who graduate from Career Pathways will have real-world work experience as well as the opportunity to earn college credit. These pathways and/or programs of study are located at the following high schools, East High School, Edison Career & Technology High School, and Rochester Early College International High School. Details about each school's programs are listed on their school profile pages. Students must meet specific criteria and complete an application for these programs.

In addition, Rochester City School District juniors and seniors have the opportunity of participating in CTE Shared-Time Programs at Edison or the Rochester Educational Opportunity Center (REOC) while staying enrolled in their current high school. Students must meet specific criteria and complete an application for the following programs. The following career prep courses are available in Shared-Time CTE Programs:
