


INTERNATIONAL BACCALAUREATE TO GUIDE STUDENT SUCCESS

In addition to IB, Wilson offers higher-level foreign language study and multiple AP courses. The school has the AVID (Advancement Via Individual Determination) program, which is designed to help underachieving students with high academic potential prepare for college and career readiness. The program is provided as both an elective credit-bearing class and a schoolwide AVID focus using strategies and practices to aid student development. Wilson also offers bilingual classes and extensive support in specialized education services, including within their Autism Spectrum Disorder program.

NORTHEAST COLLEGE PREPARATORY HIGH SCHOOL



Northeast College Preparatory High School is committed to providing a well-rounded education while promoting student voice to lift a culturally responsive curriculum that nurtures lifelong learners, advocates, and leaders. Students are offered an opportunity to lead by analyzing the school community, identifying problems and needs, conducting research, and presenting possible solutions to administration and teacher leaders through the Student Voice Committee. Northeast creates a school model where student voice matters and impacts what they do, embedded through the MIKVA curriculum, social-emotional learning, relationship building in advisory, and student wellness and development through the Ninth Grade Academv.

The campus houses a fully operational Rochester Regional health center, which offers a variety of services, including physical exams, immunizations, walk-in and scheduled appointments, medications, and counseling. The Family and Community Connections office provides services to help remove barriers for students and families to thrive, including a food pantry, clothing closet, access to agencies, and support from the home school assistant and attendance support specialist. Northeast also has over 15 agency partners, which are instrumental in mentoring, enrichment, and community engagement.

Every scholar is expected to take a full course load during all four years, either at the high school or MCC campus. Dual-credit courses with college credits, which begin in 9th grade, are offered in the areas of Art, Health, Microsoft Office, Personal Money Management, English, Spanish, Chinese, and Introduction to Business. Scholars in grades 11 and 12 will take classes on the MCC campus free of charge. The school provides a strong support system to help scholars be successful.

COLLEGE BEGINS TODAY







Students who desire high academic achievement and want to develop their artistic talents should apply to the School of the Arts (SOTA). Students at SOTA carry a full academic course load in addition to a rigorous Fine Arts sequence in one of six subject areas -Creative Writing, Dance, Drama, Music (Instrumental and Vocal), Theatre Technology, and Visual Arts. Each semester, students are required to participate in performances, showcases, recitals, and exhibitions within their major field of study. Due to the extensive Performing Arts calendar, SOTA students commit to instruction that extends well beyond the school day.

Admission to the School of the Arts is based on a formal audition process. Students will be scheduled for an audition once they complete the SOTA application. <u>The deadline to apply is</u> <u>December 16, 2022</u>. Auditions will take place in the last week of January. SCHOOL WITHOUT WALLS



School Without Walls is one of the oldest, nontraditional high schools in the nation and part of the NY Performance Standards Consortium. It is a community of learners who hold each other to high standards of behavior, school culture, and academics. Students are expected to excel in rigorous academics and complete performancebased assessments. School Without Walls emphasizes critical thinking and responsible citizenship, with a learner-centered interdisciplinary philosophy. Students are given opportunities to be involved in the school's management, decision-making, and problem-solving.

The campus has undergone renovations, including the construction of a gymnasium and fitness room and state-of-the-art science and art classrooms. School Without Walls does not participate in the NCAA clearinghouse, so students anticipating a Division I or II athletic scholarship should take this into consideration before applying.

Admission to School Without Walls is based on a separate application that is mailed to every 8th-grade student. <u>The</u> deadline to apply is Friday, March 31, 2023. Please call the school or visit the website for additional information.
