### We Can Categorize School System Spending Into Five Major Categories:



Total resources spent on classroom instructional activities

Examples: Teacher compensation, charter school tuition, and special education



Total resources provided to employees based on collective bargaining agreements and New York State Labor Laws

Examples: Health and dental insurance, retirement plans, and social security



Total resources provided to directly support students and schools

Examples: Contract transportation, District transportation, vehicle maintenance, and fuel



Total resources spent on providing operational support to schools and the District



Total resources spent on salaries for school principals, security, and administrative staff in schools

Examples: IT and facilities, maintenance, gas, and electric teachers to attend professional development, and accountability staff

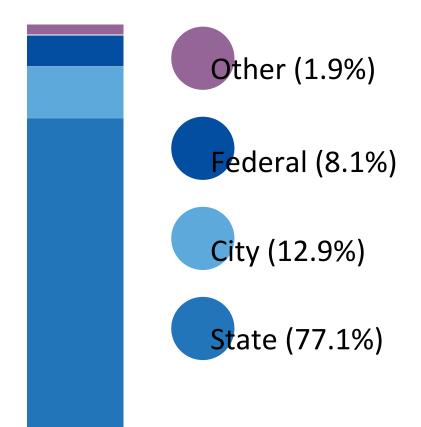

- Rochester is one of the poorest cities in the state and the nation
- More than 50% of children living in the City of Rochester live in poverty

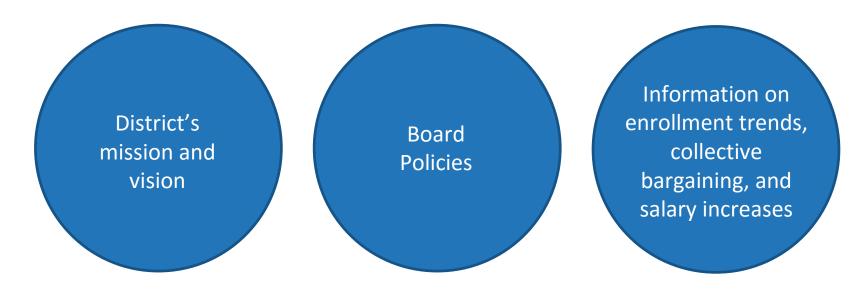

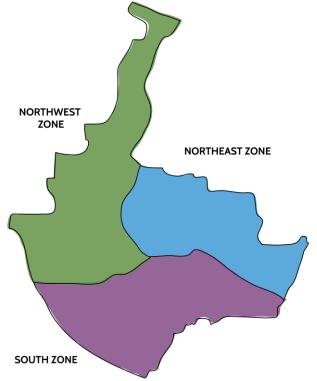
# Section Three: Districtwide Summary Budget

Explains the District's entire budget with revenue and expenditures

Includes information required by New York State law along with staffing information



Section Four: School Profiles and Budgets



- Each school has a page that goes over their budget for the school
- Includes information on early childhood, food and health services, and transportation



# Section Five: Program Profiles and Budgets

Alternative Programs available in the District (i.e., All City High, OACES, LyncX, Virtual Academy)

Includes a description of the program, it objectives and measurements, and per pupil cost



# Section Six: Administrative Profiles and Budgets

Administrative budgets in areas related to non-school departments (Central Office and others)

Includes staffing and expenditures by major category



## Section Seven: Educational Partnership Organization (EPO)



- East High School is in an agreement with the University of Rochester
- East High School has a separate administrative structure established by the U of R
- The U of R reports directly to the Board of Education

Five-year financing strategy for construction and reconstruction of facilities

Facilities Modernization Plan

A list of administrator compensation at the school level, individuals making \$135,000 dollars or more
