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RCSD Overview

The Rochester City School District has 65 schools and programs and serves nearly 30,000 students in grades PreK-12.

Student enrollment

- 3,172 (11%) Pre-K Kindergarten Students
- 4,075 (14%) English Language Learners (ELL's)
- 5,737 (21%) Students with Disabilities (SWD's)

Additionally Services are provided to:

- 5,832 students in 14 charters schools
- 2,017 students in community-based UPK
- 806 enrolled in Urban-Suburban programs
- 1,840 individuals in adult education programs





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RCSD Overview

- In 2017, data from the U.S. Census Bureau showed that Rochester had a 56% poverty rate, which ranks 3rd in the nation.
- All students are eligible for free or reduced lunch
- The District has the lowest performance rate amongst the Big 5 in New York State:
 - 11.4% proficient in ELA grades 3-8
 - 10.7% proficient in Math grades 3-8





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Our Students, Their Achievements, and Their Future

Graduation Rate

- The RCSD has achieved its highest graduation rate in more than a decade.
- 53.5% in June
- 59.3% in August

2018 NYS 3-8 ELA and Math Assessment Results

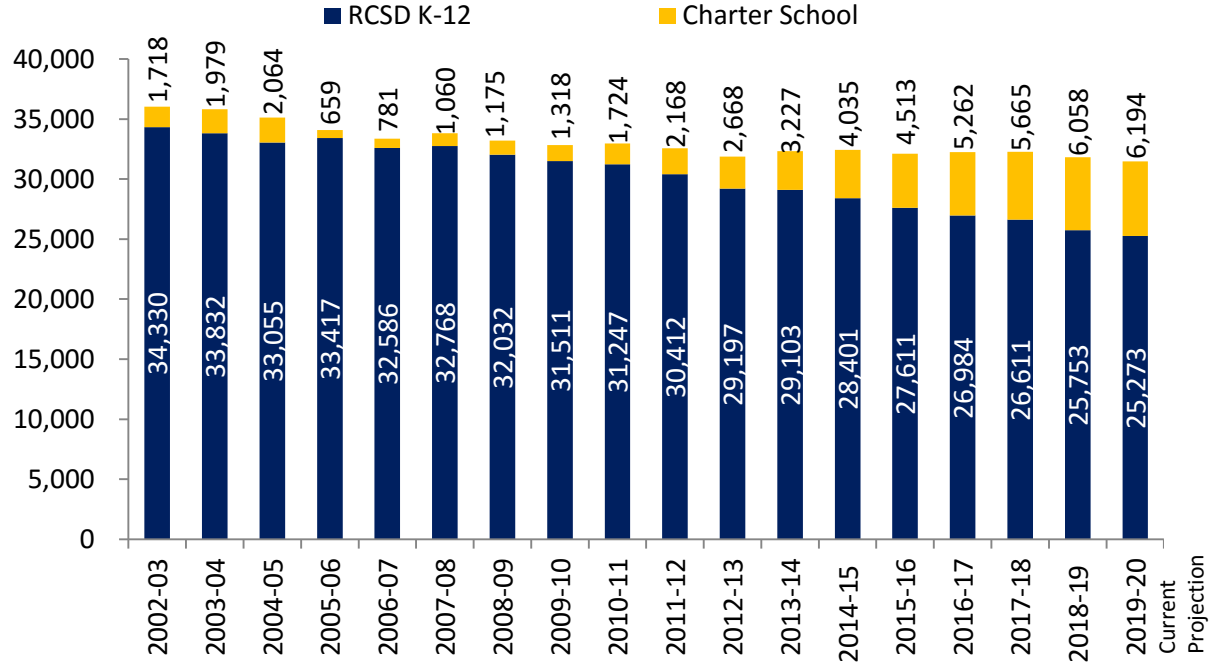
- Proficiency in ELA among students in 3rd through 8th grade was 11.4% as compared to 5.0% in 2013.
- Proficiency in math was 10.7% as compared to 5.0% in 2013.





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Student Enrollment

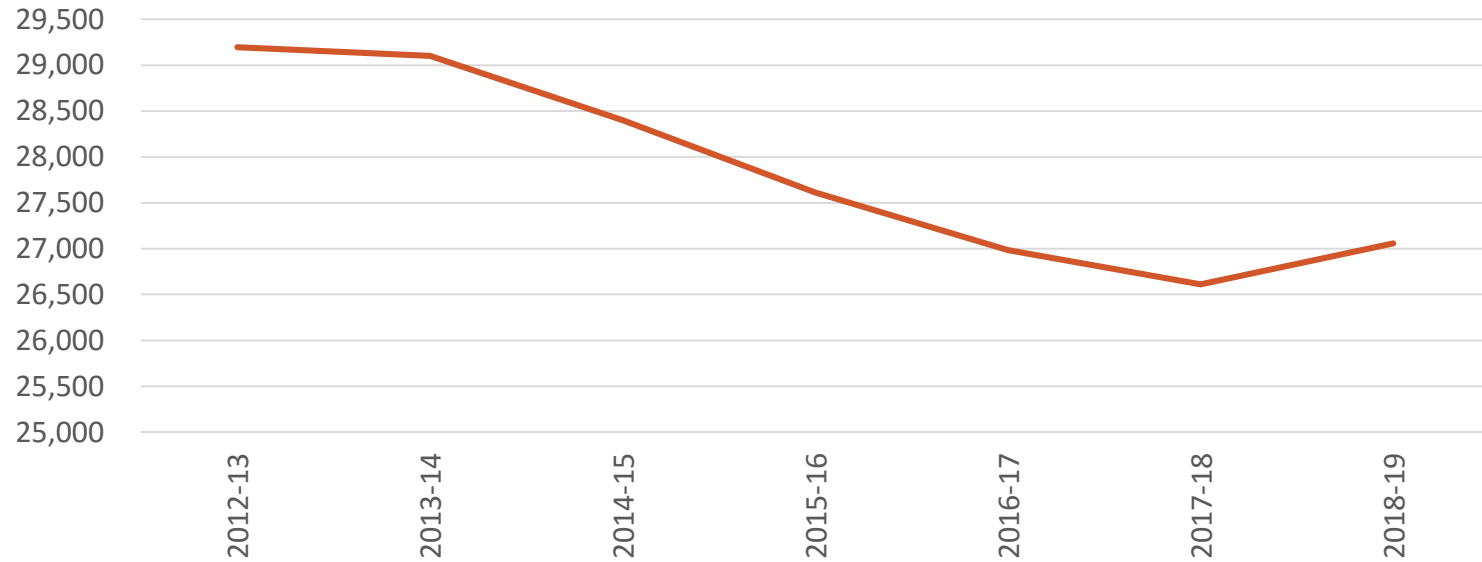


Student counts do not include Pre-K, private and parochial schools



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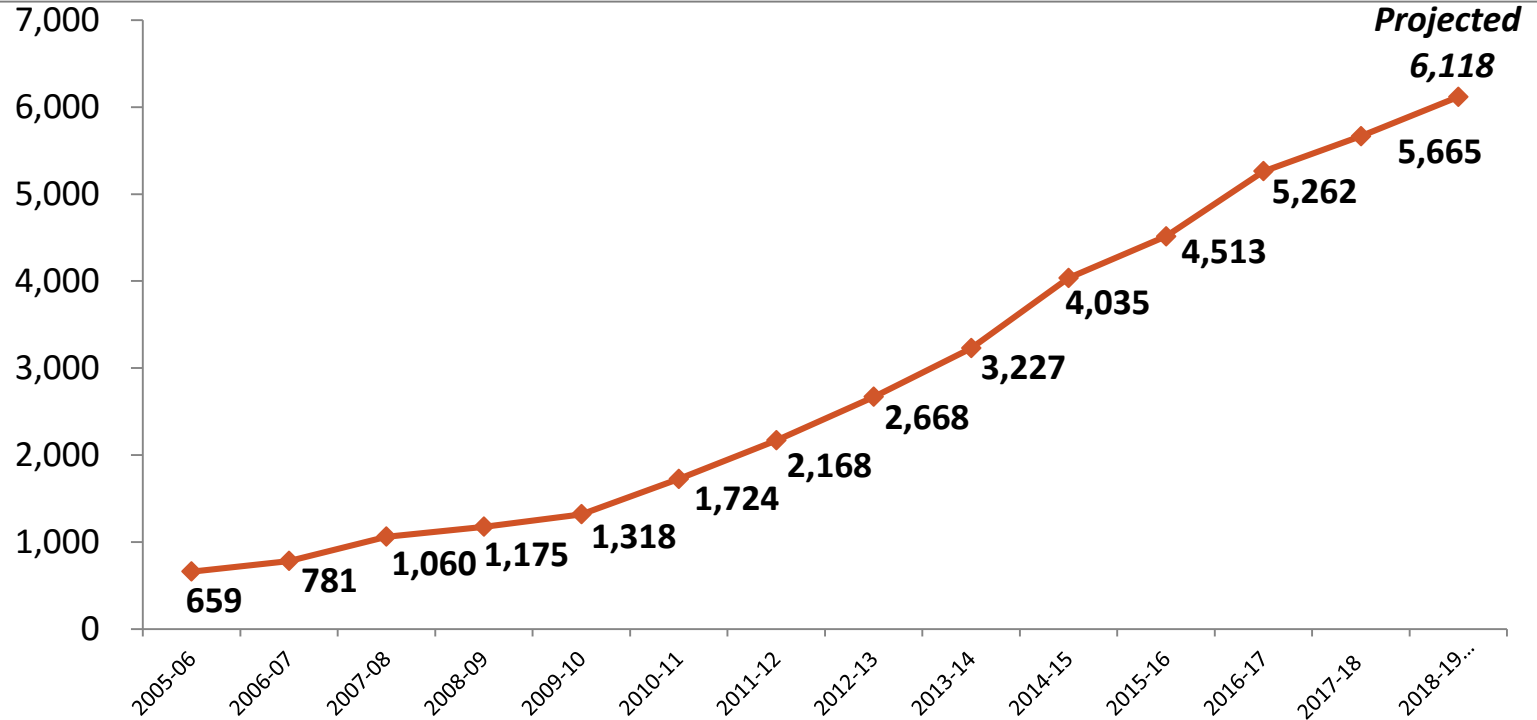
Total Enrollment





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Charter School Enrollment





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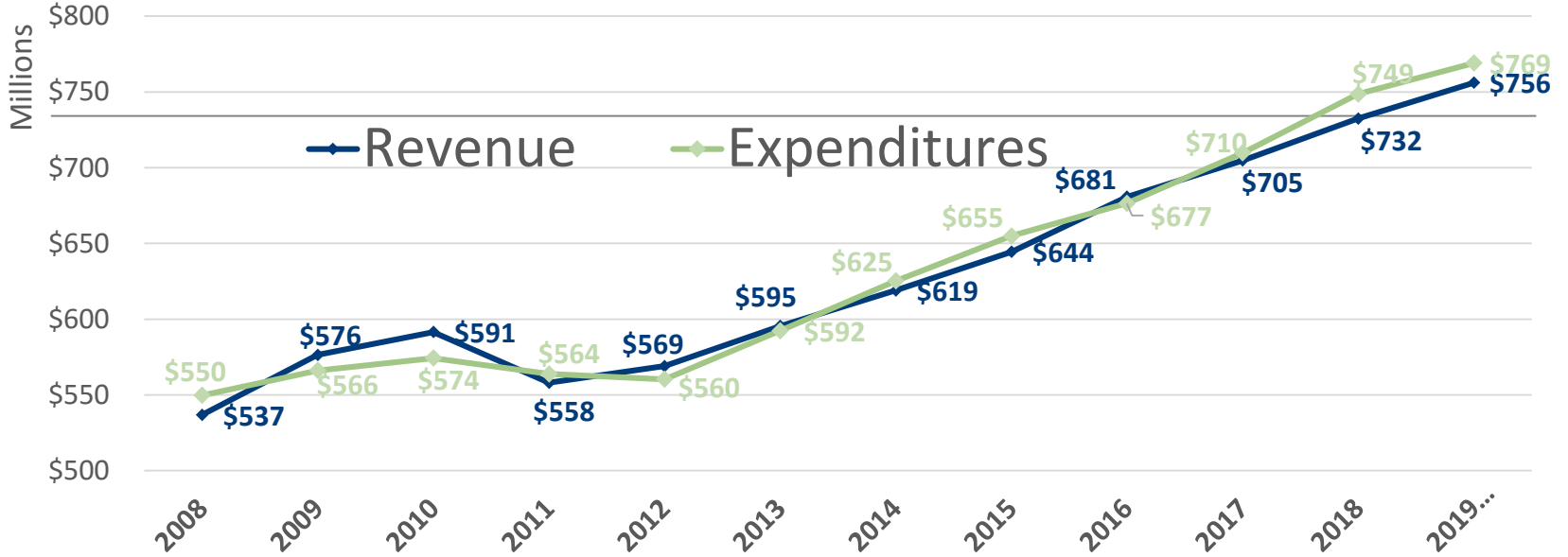
Five Factors Driving Structural Deficit

- I. **Revenue, Expenditures, and Legislation** – Foundation Aid provided by NYS has fallen short of the formula-driven allocation; City revenue has remained flat
- II. **District Footprint** – Student enrollment has declined, multiple grade-level configurations in small schools with small class sizes, and provides several alternative programs
- III. **Salaries and Benefits** – Salaries and benefits account for 59% of the District Budget, which includes additional compensation for extended learning programs and professional development.
- IV. **Transportation** – Service contracts and system efficiency, including routing, distance of schools from students' homes, school arrival and dismissal times
- V. **Student Need** – Specialized academic services for students with disabilities and English Language Learners, and several alternative programs

Net Change in Fund Balance:

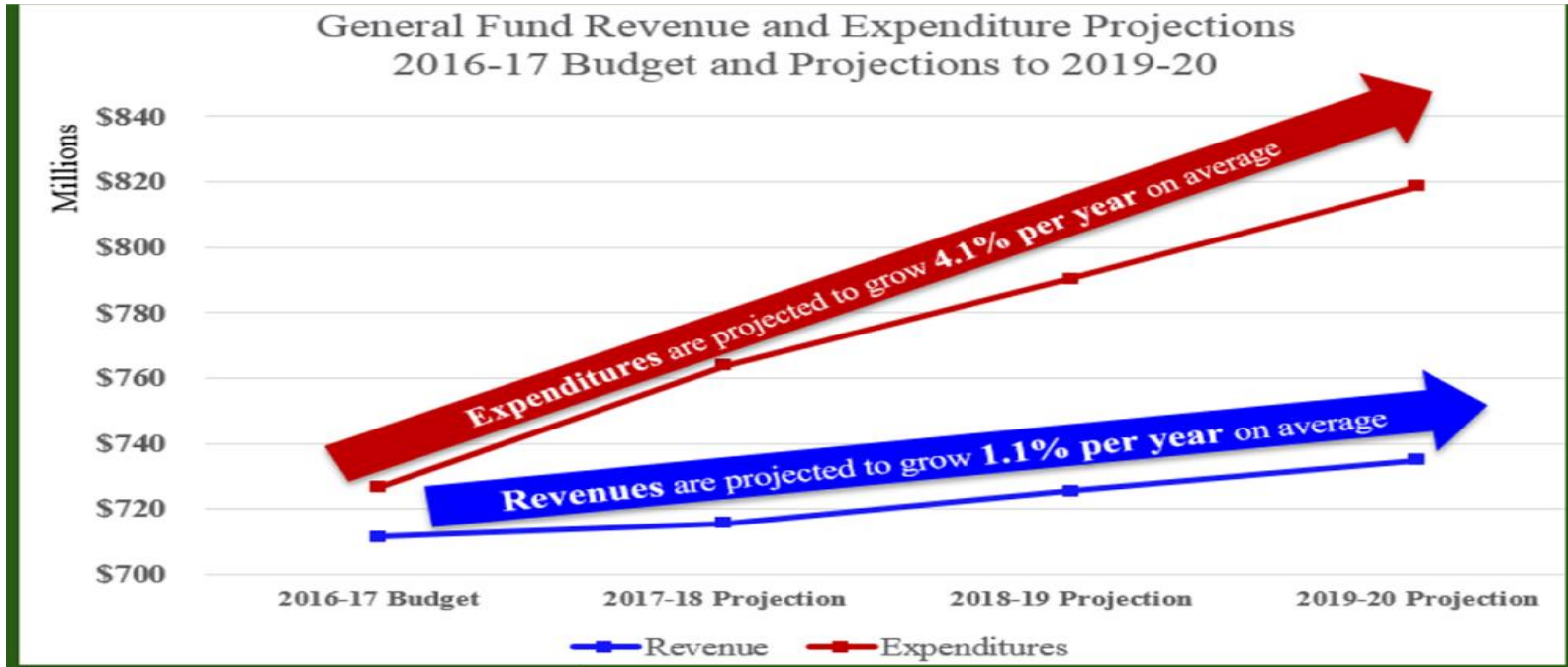

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General Fund Historic Trend

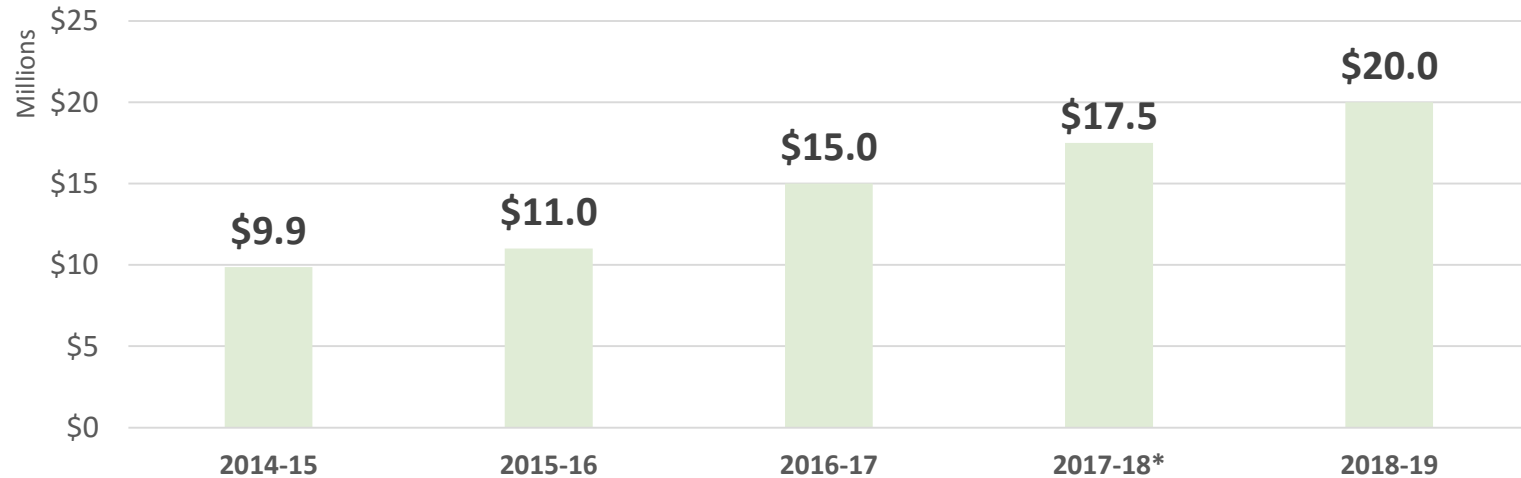




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Fund Balance Appropriation
