

Grant Name	Description
Early College High School (ECHS) <i>(State Funding)</i>	The Early College High School program, delivered in partnership with Monroe Community College, allows students to earn college credits while completing high school diploma requirements. The program provides additional supports to help students, who are historically underrepresented in institutions of higher education and/or economically disadvantaged, prepare for the expectations of college work. Previous cohorts of this grant program were called <i>Smart Scholars Early College High School</i> .
Employment Preparation Education (EPE) <i>(State Funding)</i>	Employment Preparation Education State Aid is used to provide services for adults 21 years and older who have not received a high school diploma or its equivalent. EPE funds support adult education programs including high school equivalency diploma preparation, career education, and English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL).
Extended School Day / School Violence Prevention (ESD/SVP) <i>(State Funding)</i>	RCSD's Extended School Day/School Violence Prevention grant provides funding for the Student Support Centers at Schools #8, #19, and #28. These support centers ensure students have access to trained and caring adults who can help guide them through their challenges and find non-violent solutions to their problems.
Extended School Year (ESY) / Summer Special Education Program <i>(State Funding)</i>	Extended School Year (ESY) services help Students with Disabilities maintain the academic, social/behavioral, and communication skills they have learned through the summer as required under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA). New York State reimburses RCSD for 80% of ESY program costs; the remaining 20% of costs are funded locally.
Individuals with Disabilities Act (IDEA) <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Support Services (Section 611) • Preschool Services (Section 619) <i>(Federal Funding)</i>	The purpose of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) is to provide Students With Disabilities a free, appropriate public education that prepares them for further education, employment, and independent living. These two grants provide support for the District's additional educational costs for school-age children (Section 611) and pre-school children (Section 619).
Learning Technology Grant (LTG) <i>(State Funding)</i>	The Learning Technology Grant provides professional development opportunities that help teachers deliver personalized learning in a culturally and linguistically responsive learning environment. RCSD also uses LTG funds to create new, online instructional resources for highly enrolled secondary courses that support the shift to a more personalized learning environment.
McKinney-Vento Homeless Children & Youth <i>(Federal Funding)</i>	Grant funds authorized by the McKinney-Vento Act help the District address the challenges that homeless students encounter in enrolling, attending, and succeeding in school. Students who are experiencing homelessness receive the academic and social-emotional supports they need to help them meet the challenging academic performance standards NYSED has established for all students.

Multi-Tiered System of Supports – Integrated (MTSS-I) <i>(State Funding)</i>	NYSED has integrated several multi-tiered systems of support into one coherent system (MTSS-I) and will deliver professional development, on-site coaching, and technical support to staff at three RCSD high schools. The evidence-based MTSS-I framework integrates academics and behavior to improve results for all students, particularly students with disabilities.
Office of Temporary and Disability Assistance (OTDA) / Making A Connection (MAC) Academy <i>(Federal Funding)</i>	RCSD’s Making A Connection Academy program serves refugees ages 16-24 who are not enrolled in school and provides them with the resources, education, and networks necessary to achieve self-confidence and self-sufficiency. The MAC Academy prepares participants for transition to secure and unsubsidized employment.
Optics Pipeline Grant / Math and Science High School Program <i>(State Funding)</i>	The Rochester Optics Pipeline provides novel STEM experiences and opportunities for high school students at East, Franklin, and Monroe Upper Schools. Students in the programs have access to multiple entry points into the college and career pipeline for vision care, precision optics, and mechatronics.
Pathways to Technology Early College High School (P-TECH) <i>(Federal Funding)</i>	The Pathways to Technology Early College High School program on the Edison campus combines high school and college coursework with career training opportunities. Students enrolled in P-TECH Rochester can earn an Associate of Applied Science (AAS) degree from Monroe Community College, with a concentration in cybersecurity, networking, or cloud computing, at no cost to families. Students also have opportunities for internships with Rochester employers.
Perkins V Career and Technical Education (CTE) / Secondary <i>(Federal Funding)</i>	The Carl D. Perkins CTE Improvement Act provides grants to improve the quality of Career and Technical Education. RCSD uses these funds to support secondary CTE programs and integrates career and technical instruction with rigorous academics. Students are exposed to CTE at the middle school level, and high school programs link to postsecondary education to prepare students for high-skill, high-wage, high-demand occupations in current and emerging occupations.
Prekindergarten - Universal <i>(State Funding)</i>	Prekindergarten grants support full-day, prekindergarten programs for three- and four-year olds. These programs provide environments and experiences in socialization, early literacy, and motor skill development to all eligible children, including children with disabilities and children who speak a language other than English at home. Programs are delivered at RCSD locations and community-based organization sites that are contracted and supervised by the District.

Reimbursement at the NYS/county rate is provided for the following: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Administration and other costs for the Committee on Preschool Special Education (CPSE) • ESY summer programs for preschoolers with an IEP • Student evaluations to determine Special Education needs

<p>Primary Project</p> <p><i>(Local Funding)</i></p>	<p>The Primary Project is a nationally recognized, evidence-based program that helps children in pre-kindergarten through third grade adjust to school and increase their chances for school success. Child-led play opportunities and positive relationships with trusted adults help children reduce negative behaviors, gain confidence, develop social skills, and focus on learning.</p>
<p>Refugee and Immigrant Student Welcome Program (RISWP)</p> <p><i>(State Funding)</i></p>	<p>RISWP provides many services to refugee and immigrant students and their families. These services include welcome orientations, group events, instructional supplies, and translation services. Out-of-school-time programs support the academic needs of students, and training opportunities for staff focus on trauma and cultural sensitivity.</p>
<p>Refugee School Impact Program (RSIP)</p> <p><i>(State Funding)</i></p>	<p>The Refugee School Impact Program promotes the successful integration and academic performance of the District's refugee students. Activities are designed to help refugee families navigate the educational system and access specialized services. Professional learning opportunities raise staff awareness of the unique needs of refugee students.</p>
<p>Refugee Social Services Program</p> <p><i>(Federal Funding)</i></p>	<p>The Rochester Refugee Social Services Program leverages ongoing services available in OACES and in the community to help refugees and their families achieve economic and social self-sufficiency as soon as possible after their arrival in the U.S. Services include employment preparation, transitional supports, job placement, and job retention.</p>
<p>School for the Deaf Tuition</p> <p><i>(State Funding)</i></p>	<p>RCSD receives reimbursement for the cost of tuition for Students With Disabilities who attend the Rochester School for the Deaf.</p>
<p>School Health Services</p> <p><i>(State Funding)</i></p>	<p>The School Health Services grant provides funding for school nurses who deliver mandated health services such as first aid, emergency services, student screenings, medication delivery, immunization compliance, contagious disease management, and services to children with special health concerns.</p>
<p>School Library Systems Aid</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Automation • Operating • Supplemental <p><i>(State Funding)</i></p>	<p>NYS Formula Aid for School Library Systems facilitates sharing of library resources between public and non-public school libraries. This aid supports automation and database building activities, along with operating costs such as inter-library loan, book delivery, and services for students with special needs.</p>

<p>Teachers of Tomorrow (TOT) <i>(State Funding)</i></p>	<p>The Teachers of Tomorrow grant provides financial incentives to help RCSD recruit and retain qualified teachers for subject areas that have been identified as experiencing a teacher shortage.</p>
<p>Title I of the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Part A - Improving the Academic Achievement of the Disadvantaged • Part D - Prevention and Intervention Programs for Children and Youth Who Are Neglected, Delinquent, or At-Risk <p><i>(Federal Funding)</i></p>	<p>The purpose of Title I of the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) is to "ensure that all children have a fair, equal, and significant opportunity to obtain a high-quality education and reach, at a minimum, proficiency on challenging state academic achievement standards and state academic assessments." RCSD's Title I, Part A school-wide programs deliver services to all students, focusing on students with the greatest need. Title I, Part D provides supplemental educational and transitional services to neglected and delinquent students living in residential facilities.</p>
<p>Title I of the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) School Improvement Grant Section 1003 Basic <i>(Federal Funding)</i></p>	<p>The Section 1003 Basic grant supports planning and implementation of school improvement activities in Comprehensive Support and Improvement (CSI) schools, Targeted Support and Improvement (TSI) schools, and Target Districts. Funds must be used to support activities included in School Comprehensive Education Plans (SCEPs) and the District Comprehensive Improvement Plan (DCIP).</p>
<p>Title I of the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) School Improvement Grant Section 1003 High School Redesign <i>(Federal Funding)</i></p>	<p>The Section 1003 High School Redesign grant will provide Franklin Upper School with field support from NYSED's Office of Accountability. Support will be aligned with the priorities included in Franklin's high school redesign plan and provide resources for the ninth grade academy, afterschool tutoring and clubs, mentoring programs, and professional learning.</p>
<p>Title I of the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) School Improvement Grant Section 1003 Targeted Support <i>(Federal Funding)</i></p>	<p>The Section 1003 Targeted Support grant provides additional support to schools that have been in accountability status for multiple consecutive years. Funding is used to support activities that will help schools meet their annual, identified improvement targets.</p>
<p>Title II, Part A of the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) Preparing, Training, and Recruiting High Quality Teachers & Principals <i>(Federal Funding)</i></p>	<p>The purpose of Title II of ESSA is to increase the number of highly qualified teachers in the classroom and highly qualified principals and assistant principals in schools. Grant activities focus on intensive, sustained, and high quality professional learning experiences along with the recruitment and retention of highly qualified teachers and school leaders.</p>
<p>Title III of the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) English Language Learners <i>(Federal Funding)</i></p>	<p>The purpose of Title III of ESSA is to ensure that students who are English Language Learners (ELLs) develop high levels of academic achievement and proficiency in the English language. Title III activities help ELL students meet the same challenging State academic standards as all students are expected to meet.</p>

<p>Title IV of the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) Student Support & Academic Enrichment <i>(Federal Funding)</i></p>	<p>The purpose of Title IV of ESSA is to improve students' academic achievement by 1) providing all students with access to a well-rounded education, 2) improving school conditions for student learning, and 3) improving the use of technology in order to improve the academic achievement and digital literacy of all students.</p>
<p>Workforce Innovation & Opportunity Act (WIOA) Title II / Adult Basic Education & Literacy Services <i>(Federal Funding)</i></p>	<p>The WIOA Adult Education Literacy program at OACES supports instruction in adult basic education, adult secondary education leading to a NYS high school equivalency diploma, and English for Speakers of Other Languages. The program helps adults become literate and obtain the knowledge and skills necessary for employment, retention of employment, and self-sufficiency. The program helps adults obtain the educational skills necessary to become full partners in the educational development of their children and complete their own secondary school education.</p>
<p>Workforce Innovation & Opportunity Act (WIOA) Title II Corrections Education & Other Institutionalized Education Programs <i>(Federal Funding)</i></p>	<p>The WIOA Corrections Education and Institutionalized Education program provides case management to support incarcerated individuals' transition to re-entry and other post-release services. Services include, but are not limited to, assistance in developing plans for post-release education and outreach to community-based program providers on behalf of the re-entering participants.</p>
<p>Workforce Innovation & Opportunity Act (WIOA) Title II Integrated English Literacy and Civics Education (IEL/CE) <i>(Federal Funding)</i></p>	<p>WIOA Integrated English Literacy and Civics Education provides support for adult learners aged 16 and older who are limited English proficient. These instructional programs at OACES focus on literacy, English language acquisition, the rights and responsibilities of citizenship, and civic participation.</p>
<p>Workforce Innovation & Opportunity Act (WIOA) Title II / Literacy Zones</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • North • South • East • West <p><i>(Federal Funding)</i></p>	<p>Literacy Zones and their Family Welcome Centers provide or refer out-of-school youth and adults to a variety of coordinated services and benefits. These services support adult participants who are receiving literacy services, including instruction, through a WIOA Title II adult education program.</p>
